Using Lexile Levels

Search by Lexile

Lexile[™] is a measure of how difficult a book is to comprehend (also known as "readability"), and you can use it to search Core Collections. Pair a Lexile search with other filters like Recommendation Level to find titles for readers at all levels to add to your collection.



On the Advanced Search page, find the Recommendation Level and select Essential

Then find the Lexile Reading Level and select 401-700

Or enter a specific Lexile Reading Score

Click Search

You can also use Lexile Reading Levels as a field code in a Boolean search. Here are some example searches:

LX > 420 AND LX < 650 AND RW School Library Journal

(to find chapter books with Lexile Reading Levels between 420-650 that have also received a starred review from a specific publication)

LX > 530 AND SU Mysteries

(to find books in a specific genre or subject with Lexile Reading Levels greater than 530)

Search by Lexile and age

Find award-winning titles that will be appropriate to a reader's Lexile Reading Level and age.



On the homepage, click on Award Winners

On the left under the Refine Results side bar, look under the Limit To field, and click Show More

Then in the pop up menu, go to the **Lexile Reading** Level and select 0 - 400

Click Search to find titles

To further narrow titles to early readers, select Children's Core Collection under Database to narrow titles to those for beginning readers

Find recent titles that will appeal to middle schoolers and fit their Lexile Reading Level.

On the homepage, click on 2020 Books

Click **Show More** under the Limit To field on the left

In the pop up menu, go to the Lexile Reading Level and select the appropriate level

Click Search to find titles
