The **Hugo Awards** are probably the most prestigious fantasy and science fiction awards. Categories include: literature, artwork, film, performance and other accomplishments in science fiction and fantasy.

The **Nebula Awards** recognize only literature. Categories include best novel, novella, novelette and short story.





The **World Fantasy Awards** recognize literature and artists, and are voted on by attendees of the annual World Fantasy Convention.




Fantasy Readers

Getting Up to Speed in Fantasy

What is Fantasy Fiction?

With its intuitive rather than rational approach, fantasy describes worlds that cannot exist, ones where magic rules, Fantasy deals more with emptions and relationships than ideas, and fantasy cherishes and preserves familiar stories, legends, and myths, retailing them. These are often elegantly written stories with a hounting quality. something just behind the story that hints at a larger meaning.

What happens in a Fantasy novel?

Storylines feature Good versus Evil and protagonists battling, and ultimately conquering, the dark forces. The characters, usually clearly defined as good or bad, often attain special magical gifts, and the storylines explore ways to discover one's own potential, magical or otherwise. Characters may include mythical creatures -- dragons, unicoms, elves, vizards - as well as animals that are more common. Characters more traditionally associated with Horror (vampires, werewolves, and more) may also find a home in fantasy. Quests commonly drive the plot, and adventure elements play an important role.

Elaborately detailed settings describe another world, often Earth, which does not follow earth's timeline. Thus the setting may be a pseudo-Medieval world with knights and dragons or a fictional future world with elves on motorcycles. Gritty urban settings am almost as popular as more traditional historical ones.

in general, fantasy novels generally start slowly as the author sets the scene, often involving a large group of characters in a strange world. Pacing accelerates later as the adventures become more dangerous.

Why do people like Fantasy Fiction?

Readers who appreciate well-developed landscapes in another time and place can find a range of characters. storylines, and tones to match their moods. Fantasy novels create worlds in which magic exists and battles between good and evil resolve questions of right and wrong. Novels cover a wide range of tones, from the humorous to the dark and griffy. Fans of familiar stories such as fairy tales, folk tales, and invites or legends, discover much to appreciate here, as these stories, told with a twist, often form the foundation of much fantasy. Popular themes -good versus evil, coming of age, struggling to reach one's potential and find one's place - permeate all forms of the genne. Protagonists may be made or female, and writers of both genders spin their tales here. Readers expect big books and long series; they read them in order and eagerly await each installment.
